Answer the following questions:

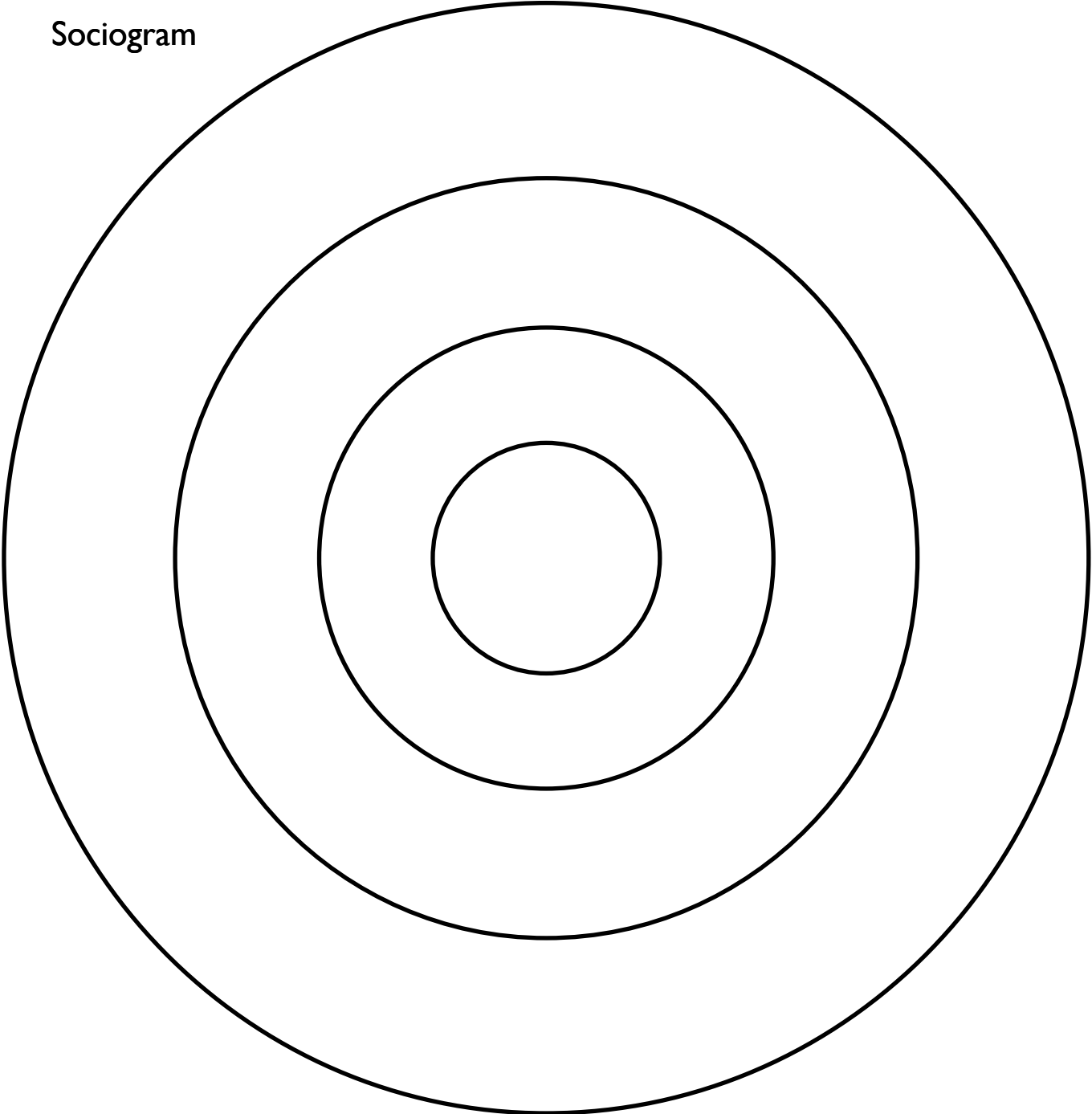
- According to you, from both classes, who is involved in arguments the most? Give 3 names:

- Write something positive about at least one person from the class.

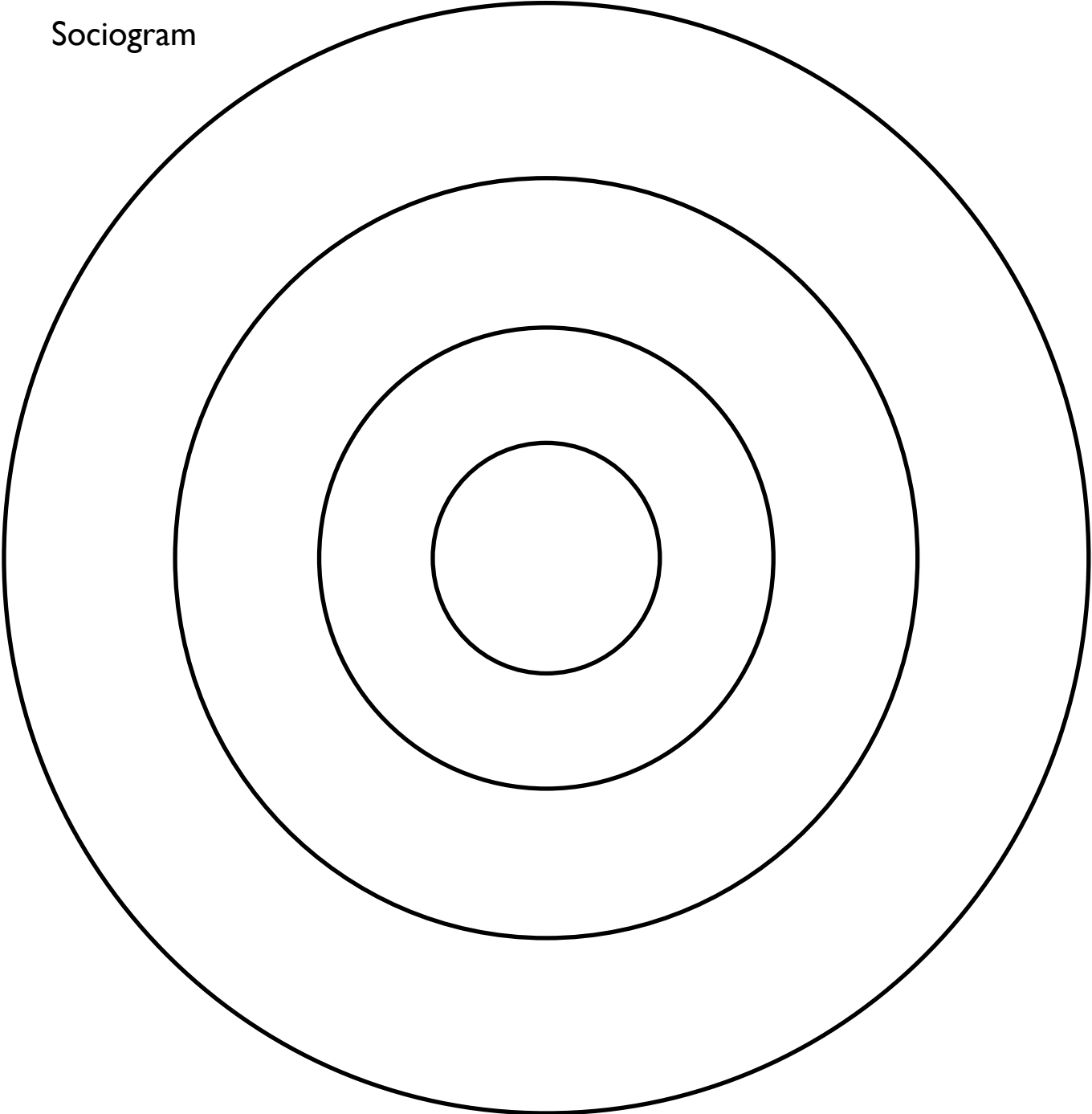
